

# **How the League Works**

# And How You Can Work with the League!

The League membership studies selected issues, the membership then decides on positions, then uses those positions to testify at legislative or local government hearings on related subjects. The League's Action Team is well-respected at the Capitol as legislators recognize the thorough work done before testimony is given.

### **Study = Position = Legislative action**

Every January, each local League around the country meets to discuss possibilities for new studies or ones to update. Studies are available online: National studies, State studies, and Local Studies. These studies or research papers are important to the League to be able to determine positions to use at the Capitol during legislative sessions. This is where the League has tremendous power in part because the entire League membership has weighed in and voted on their support of the positions.

### **Propose New Studies to Increase Inclusion.**

There is a process for proposing a new study. A study title and policy aim, the study scope and work plan, a list of interested committee members, and the rationale are all necessary components. A form is filled out and submitted to LWVOR for consideration at the state convention which will take place on May 19-21, 2023.

Suggest studies, or updates to studies, and learn more at your local **League's Program Planning meeting via Zoom to be held on Tuesday, January 24, 2023**. The Zoom link and pertinent documents will be emailed to you prior to the 24th. Study proposals are due Feb. 1, 2023, three months before the state convention. At the convention, study proposals are voted on and timelines are planned for all local Leagues.

## 2023 LEGISLATIVE ACTION TEAM SESSION PRIORITIES

- PROTECT DEMOCRACY by supporting campaign finance reform statutes to implement the M 107 constitutional amendment. Advocate for an independent citizen redistricting commission as in IP 13 or 14. Expand automatic voter registration and fund up-to-date, efficient, and secure election software that can support alternative voting methods.
- SUPPORT STRATEGIES TO ASSURE HOUSING FOR ALL by increasing investments in rental assistance, new affordable rental, and home ownership homes, permanent supportive housing, preserve existing affordable housing, homeless shelters, navigation centers, and Project Turnkey operations.
- ADVOCATE FOR ANTI-POVERTY PROGRAMS AND HEALTH CARE REFORMS by preserving adequate Medicaid funding to build on Oregon's innovation to cover all kids and vulnerable adults. Focus on services for seniors, people with disabilities, and foster youth. Expand accessibility to behavioral health services focused on addiction and mental health treatment.
- PROMOTE PUBLIC SAFETY MEASURES by seeking effective strategies to achieve a fairer and more equitable criminal justice system and to successfully implement gun safety laws and violence-prevention programs.
- ASSURE ADEQUATE REVENUE for essential services while promoting equitable and progressive tax policy. Access federal funds for infrastructure and other Oregonians' needs.
- ADDRESS THE CLIMATE EMERGENCY by supporting 2017-2021 Carbon/Climate Executive Orders, net zero greenhouse gas emissions before 2050 while ensuring environmental justice with a just transition for workers and impacted communities.
- SUPPORT STATEWIDE PLACE-BASED WATER PLANNING to assure all Oregonians, aquatic creatures, agricultural economy and other businesses have abundant clean water in the future.

# **Call For Volunteers**



The LWVOR is part of and is a leader of the <u>People Not Politicians</u> coalition. You may already know that PNP has refiled its redistricting initiative for 2024 as IP 13 and IP 14. We are preparing for the time when we receive certified ballot titles and begin gathering signatures in earnest for only one of these petitions, probably in January or February. Part of our plan is to mail a new petition to many of those voters who signed IP 57 two years ago. To do this we have created an online process to verify the IP 57 signatures with voter registration records and add them to a database. We can then use that database for future mailings and other purposes. You can do this volunteer work from home using your home computer and a website. Very little computer skill is needed for this work, and you may do the work as you have time available. If you can help, please contact Chris Cobey or Norman Turrill.

### **Twitter Stance**

The National League has expressed this about the latest Twitter issues:

<u>LWV Update 12/16/22:</u> Freedom of the press is both an essential right and a core pillar of American democracy. We are disturbed by the recent censorship of journalists across Twitter and will continue to monitor developments across this platform. The League sends its support to all those working to build a fair and free nation.

The LWVUS Communications Team is closely monitoring the changes on Twitter and their effects on the voting rights community. Many of these shifts are still playing out, and their impact has yet to be determined.

As of this writing, LWVUS has determined we will remain on Twitter. That said, we are evaluating and exploring new social platforms if, in the future, we determine Twitter is no longer a viable or reliable tool for our organization. We will let Leagues know ASAP if our stance on Twitter changes.

### Reasons to Remain on Twitter

We are proud to stand strong as a trustworthy, nonpartisan, pro-democracy thought leader on social media, and we recommend that Leagues continue empowering voters across Twitter.

### **Childcare Study Update**

At Convention 2021, LWV of Washington County proposed a restudy of LWVOR's <u>1985 Childcare</u> <u>Position</u>. The current pandemic has highlighted and exacerbated childcare issues and inequities.

The committee has completed this study update which will be published soon. Childcare concerns have changed dramatically since our <u>1988 - Childcare In Oregon</u> Study. We do not anticipate changing our advocacy position.

### Democracy is in our DNA.

For over 100 years now, the League of Women Voters has been promoting education, civic engagement, and democracy itself. These values are part of our DNA.



But you know what? The whole point of DNA is to pass it on.

Let's do that.

The League of Women Voters of Oregon is revitalizing and re-energizing its student outreach program. You can get involved in that, and you can get involved as an emissary to each of our schools here in Douglas County.

Young people are deeply concerned about climate change, school safety, economic insecurity, personal liberty, and democracy. Yet young people are not fully engaged in the political process. At the same time, schools in Oregon and elsewhere do not always teach adequately about civics. Oregon has mandated civics education in schools, but full implementation is still in the future: 2025. Surveys show a declining commitment to democracy itself, particularly among youth. Let's fix that.

The first Gen-Z member of Congress was (Nov 8, 2022) elected from Florida (Maxwell Alejandro Frost, age 25); about half of Gen-Z have already graduated high school. So, we need to move fast, and keep up the pace.

The Oregon Student Mock Election education package has been a mainstay for years, and now it is better than ever. Check it out: <a href="https://www.lwvor.org/mock-election">https://www.lwvor.org/mock-election</a>.

The League offers a robust <u>Civics Education Curriculum</u> with five Civics Education units:

- Unit 1: We Are the Government
- Unit 2: Who Can Vote?
- Unit 3: Your Vote Is Your Voice
- Unit 4: Registering to Vote
- Unit 5: Voting in Oregon

Each unit includes activities, discussion topics, and prepared handouts—and a world of resources. It's practically a turn-key operation for any teacher (or other presenters).

Jenny Carloni and I are currently part of an LWVOR group that is working on youth outreach. We invite you to join us, and join the movement:


